The first reading for Palm Sunday Year C fits into the larger message of Isaiah by showing trust in God during suffering. This passage is part of the "Servant Songs," which describe a servant who faithfully carries out God's mission, even when faced with rejection and pain. The servant relies on God for strength and does not turn away from the challenges of his calling.

This reflects Isaiah's broader themes of hope, trust in God's help, and the promise of redemption. The passage points to the suffering servant's role in bringing salvation, which Christians see fulfilled in Jesus during His Passion and crucifixion.

On Palm Sunday Year C, we reflect on Jesus' cry from the cross, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" This line from Psalm 22 shows the depth of Jesus' suffering but also reminds us of God's faithfulness. The psalm speaks to times when we feel alone or distant from God. It encourages us to remember how God has helped us before and to trust that He will be with us again.

Despite pain and doubt, the psalm calls us to hold onto faith and praise God.

The Letter to the Philippians teaches humility and unity through Jesus' example. Paul emphasizes Jesus' willingness to lower Himself, becoming a servant and accepting death on a cross for humanity. This ultimate act of love and obedience leads to His exaltation as Lord of all.

For Palm Sunday Year C, the first reading connects to Jesus' journey to the cross, showing the meaning behind His sacrifice. It calls believers to follow His example of humility, service, and trust in God. It reminds us to honour Jesus as King and to live with the same attitude of selfless love.

The readings for Palm Sunday Year C show key themes in the Gospel of Luke. Jesus' entry into Jerusalem highlights His identity as the humble Messiah and King. The crowds praise Him, but soon events take a darker turn. The Gospel continues with the Last Supper, Jesus' arrest, trial, and crucifixion. These moments show His deep love and willingness to suffer for humanity.

Luke emphasizes Jesus' care for others, even in His pain, and His trust in the Father's plan. These events call us to reflect on Jesus' mission of mercy and His invitation to follow Him in faith and humility.

#### Isaiah 50:4-7

#### **First reading**

The Lord has given me a disciple's tongue. So that I may know how to reply to the wearied he provides me with speech. Each morning he wakes me to hear, to listen like a disciple. The Lord has opened my ear. For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away. I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheeks to those who tore at my beard; I did not cover my face against insult and spittle. The Lord comes to my help, so that I am untouched by the insults. So, too, I set my face like flint; I know I shall not be shamed.

#### **Responsorial Psalm**

R. My God, my God, why have you abandoned me. All who see me deride me. They curl their lips, they toss their heads. 'He trusted in the Lord, let him save him; let him release him if this is his friend.' R. Many dogs have surrounded me, a band of the wicked beset me. They tear holes in my hands and my feet. I can count every one of my bones. R. They divide my clothing among them. They cast lots for my robe. O Lord, do not leave me alone, my strength, make haste to help me! R. I will tell of your name to my brethren and praise you where they are assembled. 'You who fear the Lord give him praise; all sons of Jacob, give him glory. Revere him, Israel's sons.' R.

#### Second reading

His state was divine, yet Christ Jesus did not cling to his equality with God but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave, and became as men are, and being as all men are, he was humbler yet, even to accepting death, death on a cross. But God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names so that all beings in the heavens, on earth and in the underworld, should bend the knee at the name of Jesus and that every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord, to the glory of God the Father.
